

TOP TEN THINGS EVERY ENRP STUDENT SHOULD DO WHILE STUDYING AT GW

1. Attend oral arguments at the Supreme Court or DC Circuit Court of Appeals when it is hearing an environmental case
2. Attend a Congressional Hearing on an environmental matter (e.g., held by Senate Committee on Environment and Public Works, House Energy & Commerce Committee, or one of several other committees and subcommittees)
3. Attend a public hearing or advisory committee session convened by a Federal agency (e.g., EPA, the Forest Service, the Park Service) on an environmental matter
4. Attend First Wednesday Seminars at Resources for the Future (includes free lunch). Get an international perspective by attending an environmental event at the World Bank, the Inter-American Development Bank, or a foreign embassy
5. Attend at least one environmental policy event at a think tank with a world view other than your own (e.g., if you're left-liberal, go to a Heritage, Cato, or Mercatus event; if right-conservative, go to a Center for American Progress, World Resources Institute, or People for the American Way event)
6. Observe a political protest/demonstration on an environmental issue
7. If you're looking for an alternative to driving, walking, or Metro, sign up for Capital Bikeshare (but always wear a helmet!)
8. Take in a couple of films at the "Environmental Film Festival in the Nation's Capital" (usually in March)
9. Explore local ecosystems in places like Rock Creek Park, the Chesapeake Bay, the Shenandoah Valley National Park, or Sugarloaf Mountain, or in curated venues, like Kenilworth Aquatic Gardens or the U.S. Botanic Garden on Capitol Hill
